YOUR CHANCE TO BE PART OF OUR COMMUNITY NETWORK


Most people like to know what's happening in their community, especially in Tawa.

SHELTER AT TAWA STATION

An email from a Tawa resident expressing the following concerns about Tawa Station was sent to the Greater Wellington Region Council recently:

"The design of the station design seems to have significant shortcomings in its real purpose which is to give waiting passengers shelter. The openness of the design means that there is no shelter from the wind anywhere. It just eddies around the many open spaces, and it is a very miserable and cold, drafty place to wait, especially in winter.

It seems that the architects have not taken into account that the valley is a wind tunnel, exposed to all the prevailing winds and that this station bears the brunt of them all. It would be great if a few of the gaps could be filled in. Not a great expense surely for a bit more plastic strategically in place to divert those cold southerlies without jeopardising its openness which presumably is to prevent vandalism."

The response received from Greater Wellington Regional Council is as follows:

"The new Tawa Station building was built around a number of factors which included the provision of shelter and safety for users.

We have not received many complaints regarding the tunnel effect of the wind that comes through the valley, nevertheless it is always a challenge to eliminate the ingress of all weather while also adhering to important principles of personal security and resistance to vandalism.

When the building was designed the architect was encouraged to design the waiting area with the weather in mind, however they also had to think about the security of the area. Any element of enclosure tends to create an entrapment zone which we try to avoid under the crime prevention through environmental design (CPTED) process.

The building we have now is far superior in terms of protection, as there is a central area which is well lit and under CCTV observation whereas previously there were just corners to retreat to in bad weather. Apart from the personal security issue it would be difficult to enclose the area without encouraging further graffiti and vandalism that happens at almost all rail stations throughout the region.

We will monitor the situation as winter progresses."

THE PATHWAY FROM KENEPURU STATION TO CENTRAL PORIRUA

The following query was received from a local resident:

"As one who regularly cycles on the new [Tawa Valley] pathway I would suggest the main priority now is to lobby the Porirua City Council to get on and complete the pathway from Kenepuru to Porirua and thus connect with the pathways of Porirua, including Ara Harakeke. After rain this portion of track gets really muddy and with it being stony it is not good for road bikes."

The gist of the Porirua City Council response is as follows:

The Porirua City Council had looked at constructing their part of the pathway before now. However they had been made aware that KiwiRail were going to be carrying out some substantial work near the railway

line which would have had a major impact on the pathway. That work is nearing completion. Thus PCC have delayed starting the project until that aspect is dealt with.

PCC will start the construction work this year but do not currently have enough funds allocated. They would like to see it completed within a twelve-month timeframe but need to gain approval to bring forward the funding. There are no guarantees of that happening. A key factor will be whether all of the necessary funding is approved for all the work to be done in one twelve-month period. If that doesn't happen, it is likely to be spread out over a longer period.



UPPER COLLINS AVE

At th end of the most recent Tawa community newsletter, mention was made of the 'rural' aspect of upper Collins Ave. A local resident, who wishes to remain anonymous, subsequently sent through the following:

"Living on this road, we have watched the development of this hillside with interest over the years. When it was subdivided many years ago (perhaps 15+), the front section next to the road was bought by a person whom I've heard is a retired GP from Porirua. He built a ramshackle hut in which to practise piano and, for a long time, walks down the road were accompanied by various melodies.

The council eventually declared the hut 'unsafe' and he built another, but there has been no music for some years now - I assume the rain got to the piano!

There have been numerous sub-lets to assorted farmlet interests or horse grazing, and there have been pigs (on two occasions), goats and allsorts over the years, with regular checks from SPCA either giving a tick or making recommendations. One of the houses directly opposite on Collins Ave has people who assisted the owner to occasionally feed animals if he wasn't there for a bit.

A year or so ago a large male pig got out onto the road and my adult son & I cautiously tried to contain it whilst contacting police/SPCA! The pigs disappeared not long after! In the course of that event, I discovered the name of the owner. He turns up every morning to feed whatever is currently there.

I only know a fraction of the history, but the above is accurate as far as I'm aware. There have been no horses

for several years now, only cockerels which still regularly crow to announce the morning and chooks to wander the berms and even incautiously cross the road. Why does the chicken cross the road, when its source of food is on one side only?

The latest update is that I haven't seen or heard the cockerels over the last week or two - perhaps they have now gone also. Plenty of hens about still."
