ADDITIONAL DEFIBRILLATOR SPONSORED FOR TAWA COMMUNITY

Harcourts Foundation Supports Community Patrol

The Harcourts Foundation has supplied an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) for use by the Tawa Community Patrol. Harcourts Tawa Realty supported an approach to the Foundation by the Patrol and was pleased to officially hand over the AED unit to the Patrol in Tawa recently. Steve Loader, co-owner of Harcourts Tawa Realty, said the Community Patrol was regarded as a valued asset in the Tawa, Linden and Grenada North area where it operated in close liaison with Porirua Police.

Established in 2008, the Community Patrol now has 33 members and a patrol car equipped with communications equipment and basic emergency resources. The Patrol operates as the "eyes and ears" of the Police with the aim of providing a safer community for local residents.

"The new defibrillator will be a useful addition to the Patrol's resources," says Steve Loader, "and the local real estate agency is delighted that the Harcourts Foundation, a national body funded by Harcourts Agents, approved the funding application for the unit."

There are now nine AEDs located at strategic locations in Tawa – Tawa Medical Centre, Mervyn Kemp Library, Tawa Community Centre, Tawa Fire Station, Outlet City, Drummond's Pharmacy, 24/7 Fitness, Power Systems Consultants and the Community Patrol.

Wellington Free Ambulance supplied the AED to the Patrol and provided training in its use to the Patrol's 33 members.

PEDESTRIAN LINK BETWEEN VICTORY CRES AND THE MAIN ROAD

Work is currently under way creating a path between the Main Road and Victory Crescent. This, according to the Wellington City Council, "..... is a further step in improving the pathway network in Tawa. By sealing this well-used link through the Victory Crescent Reserve we will enhance the local linkages to schools, parks, shops and other recreational facilities in the area.

A good example of this is the new five kilometres walking and cycling track linking Tawa and Porirua which runs alongside the Porirua Stream and was finished in April this year. It is great to see people already using and enjoying the Tawa Valley Pathway and reaping the lasting transport, health and safety benefits that it provides.



As part of the work we also plan to upgrade the 'crossing' at the bottom of the path across the Main Road to a full pedestrian crossing. This is a busy crossing and warrants further improvement to ensure the ongoing safety of pedestrians using it.

Whilst there will be some disruption during construction, it will be kept to a minimum and access to homes will be maintained at all times."

I tutor painting classes one on one for people with disabilities/cancer/chronic pain ... depression.

It works like this. They book between 1-2 hours with me on a day that they feel well enough to go out. I do not mind if they have to cancel a class when they do not feel up to it. It is in my home studio so they can be creative at their own pace. Most people find it like therapy.

I have ME/CFS, so totally understand their everyday struggle. That's why I only book one session a day. It is my way of paying forward. Cost is \$15/hour.

On a personal note

A little time away from New Zealand can make one appreciate what we have going for us here. On the whole we do have it pretty good in this farflung corner of the world!

Karen and I returned earlier this month from a 30 days overseas holiday. We spent time in each of California, Kent, London, Berlin, Vienna, Venice, Rome and Hong Kong, plus a short stint on the Mediterranean. The latter was very relaxing and a welcome break.

I made a few mental notes along the way as to what was great about the places we visited, and what I realise I actually appreciate about life back here, aspects of day-to-day living in New Zealand which we so often take for granted.

What's great about Europe:

- The history and so many marvellous old buildings, especially in the likes of Vienna, and even more so in Rome. I enjoy wandering around both English country villages and narrow alleyways in Italian cities, along which scooter riders roar, narrowly dodging errant pedestrians! As for Venice and its canals, it really is unique and well worth a visit!
- The public transport systems. We rode underground trains, overground trains, buses, trams, a gondola, and even a taxi (once!).





I was intrigued by the number of cyclists in Berlin. Ordinary people wearing ordinary clothes (i.e. no lycra) and mostly no helmets. And we both enjoyed biking with our former German exchange student in Potsdam (near Berlin) sans helmet!

- The weather. We struck it good most of the time, regularly 25-32 degrees. After all, it was mid-summer and consistently warm/hot, apart from a brief period in England during which the jersey came out for the only time.
- The vibrancy in the evenings. Wander the touristy parts of town mid-evening and you'll be just one of hundreds also doing so. Nice to peruse the shops and outdoor

stalls well into a warm evening, or to dine outside and watch the world go by!

• Hearing absolutely nothing about a certain 'Dotcom' individual for one whole month was a real bonus!

What's so great about returning to NZ:

- The friendliness of the average Kiwi. People serving in stores and restaurants in New Zealand are generally very pleasant. At the local supermarket the checkout operators are friendly and often downright chatty, and we don't give it a second thought! In some overseas cities those providing a service are very matter-of-fact, doing the job they need to do but with little, or no, customer rapport. In our experience that happened more often than not! A distinct contrast to the friendly service we take for granted here. Often foreigners visiting this country make comments along the same lines. Long live that cheerful Kiwi demeanour!
- There being only 4.4 million of us means we don't have to jostle for space on the street or jump the queue to get ahead. We're not as 'pushy' as some peoples and we're pretty orderly when it comes to waiting in line. And our lines are never all that long in any case, well not compared with many overseas!
- Knowing that the advertised price in a store or more particularly a restaurant is the total price! It's refreshing not having to pay a 'mandatory' service charge of 15% on top of the advertised price or, on occasion, a surcharge (albeit just a few euros) on top of the service charge which is already on top of the advertised price!
- The knowledge that most (although admittedly not all) car drivers stop for pedestrians on pedestrian crossings in this country. In some European cities I asked myself why they even bothered painting crossings on the road. I didn't have an answer. The vast majority of drivers have no intention of stopping for pedestrians. Fortunately most do here. The white stripes on the road actually serve a purpose!
- And last, but not necessarily least, the fact that cigarette smoking is much less acceptable in many aspects of NZ society than it is in parts of Europe. It's banned in many more places here, which is great for those of us who prefer clean air!

In summary, we have so much going for us here! Many overseas places are great to visit, to enjoy a holiday and to experience the differences, before coming home with a greater appreciation of what's so good about our very own backyard and the Kiwi way of life, warts and all!
