### TIME'S RUNNING OUT TO APPLY FOR A TAWA COMMUNITY GRANT

The Tawa Community Board has \$15,000 each year to be made available to worthy local causes. The Tawa Community Grants Fund is designed to assist voluntary projects in Tawa.

Grants may be made for charitable, educational, welfare, community development, cultural, recreational, sporting, activity development, equipment or training programmes. Applications close 28 February 2019.

To be eligible, applicants must:

- show that their project benefits residents of Tawa
- not have excess unallocated reserve funds

Preference will be given to projects that will be completed within 12 months.

### **UPPER STEBBINGS VALLEY DEVELOPMENT**

A community update on the Upper Stebbings Valley development took place earlier this week at the Linden Social Centre. The meeting was organised by Northern Ward city councillors Jill Day, Malcolm Sparrow and Peter Gilberd. Mayor Justin Lester and David Mitchell, Council's Senior Spatial Planning Advisor, spoke to and answered questions from an audience of 80 or so interested residents, not only from Tawa, but also Churton Park and Glenside.

We were told that Council has gone back to the drawing board in terms of a proposed road connection from Upper Stebbings Valley over the hill to Tawa.

Over the first half of 2019 the next steps will be to undertake a detailed design process, initially focused on Upper Stebbings Valley. This will include transport and roading work. Council officers will also undertake detailed assessments such as earthworks modelling, development feasibility, and streams and ecology analysis.

Later in the year a detailed structure plan will be developed. This will involve Councillor, stakeholder and public engagement phases. Watch this space!

### **OUTER GREEN BELT PUBLIC CONSULTATION**

Public consultation is now under way on the Draft Outer Green Belt Management Plan 2019.

On the WCC website: "The Outer Green Belt is a series of reserves on the edge of the city that stretch from the Porirua City boundary to the south coast [of Wellington]. It covers more than 3,000 hectares and comprises over half of the City's public reserves network." This includes Spicer Forest and Te Ngahere-o-Tawa (formerly Forest of Tane) on Tawa's western hills.

### **TAWA PLAZA UPGRADE**

As you may have seen, the upgrade of Tawa Plaza is nearing completion. We are currently awaiting the catenary lighting installation which is now scheduled for March.

Both positive and negative feedback has been received about the upgrade which, as already stated, is yet to be completed.

Significant consultation was undertaken – over a three-year period – with the Tawa community including local businesses, councillors, the Tawa Community Board and Tawa Residents'



Association before the final upgrade designs were "signed off". Overhauling the plaza and making it a more appealing place to visit included (as per the WCC website) "new planting, street furniture, bright pavements – vibrant pavement design – and lighting". We now have all of the above, with the lighting yet to come.

An official opening event is likely to take place later in March. We'll keep you posted in regard to that.

## PARKING IMPROVEMENTS IN TAWA

A number of parking spaces in the central shopping area have now been widened. With the formerly narrow spaces, encroachment on the next space often meant that the adjacent space was rendered useless anyway.

There has been a slight reduction in the overall number of parking spaces on the Main Road between Lincoln Ave and the Cambridge St/Lyndhurst Road roundabout, similarly slightly fewer parking spaces outside the Tawa Community Centre in Cambridge St.

### 2 MINUTES WITH ..... Gary Beecroft



Gary Beecroft was presented with a Tawa Community Civic Award in June 2018 for his many roles in the Tawa community. This was the wording on his citation at the time:

"Gary is on the board of the Tawa Rugby Club and for many years has been the 'go-to man', often seen on match day, ensuring the pitches are properly marked up and that everything runs smoothly. He recently became President of Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves, and played a part in last year's [2017] purchase by Wellington City Council of The Forest of Tane which shares access to his home. He is also chair of the relatively new Tawa MenzShed group and has been instrumental in securing new premises for the group in Oxford St's Rural Fire Depot, thus seeing a MenzShed established in Tawa."

### Where were you born?

I was born and bred in Otago. We lived first in Purakaunui, a small dairy and fishing village on the Otago Coast between Port Chalmers and Waitati, then Dunedin (where I met my wife to be), and Central Otago.

### Where did you grow up?

Most of my childhood was spent living in Purakaunui and Dunedin North. We came from a rural background and, as children, life out of school was mostly outdoors – farming, fishing, shooting and walking the hills.

### Where were you educated?

I went to school in Dunedin, North East Valley primary, and Otago Boys High School. My time at OBHS set me up for my life ahead and was very rewarding. Over the span of my working life I continued my education. So I started at Dunedin Teachers College, then Otago University, BA in Education, and a B Sc in Geology & Geography, a post grad in Natural Resources Management at Lincoln; some years later a Soils Diploma at the Egyptian International Centre for Agriculture, Cairo, Egypt, and finally an Executive Management Program at the University of Virginia, USA.

#### How long have you lived in Tawa?

Our family moved to live beside the Forest of Tawa 20 years ago. A great decision which has just got better each year.

What about family? Megan is a Policy Manager at the Ministry of

Social Development. My children have spent all their lives in Tawa. Now Sandie (18) is beginning a design course at Massey, and Campbell (20) is doing Chemistry and Psychology at Victoria.

### Work experience over the years

Following university I was a soils conservator with the Otago Regional Council, then Soil Scientist with the DSIR working irrigation and drainage, Dean of Science and Technology at Eastern Institute of Technology Hawkes Bay, CEO of the Agriculture ITO, Dairy Group General Manager, Lark International China, CEO of the Retail Meat ITO, and CEO of Retail Meat New Zealand.

#### Work experience over the years

As a young man I loved the outdoors, farming, fishing, shooting, canoeing, tramping, and mountaineering. In Tawa, now a bit older and slower, and with teenage children, I have become very involved in the Tawa Rugby Club, the Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves, and the MenzShed. I also do a little house renovating.
