



"Just to let you know that the food that KCA has already received from Rotary's "Stuff the Trolley" is going out to families working with our partner agency Supergrans in Tawa.

Michele [Rowe] has been taking photos of the daily deliveries that we are receiving from Rotary and they are in this week's photo album on KCA's Facebook page.

As of today KCA has redistributed 30.7 tonnes of food in 19

days that we have been open in May 2020. We have had a few volunteers return at level 2 so are up to 10 people assisting us."

## CONGRATULATIONS TO TERRY ROCHE ON HIS QSM

Terry Roche, a volunteer in the Tawa community for almost 50 years, has been awarded the Queen's Service Medal for services to the community.

It all began in 1972 when Terry joined Tawa Jaycees and wife Jill joined Jaycee Wives. They joined for community involvement and for the opportunity to meet like-minded people. "To quote my late wife, they were memorable years," he says.

Terry, now 86, was widowed a long time ago, but the friendships have held firm and he has continued with memberships of many local groups.

An active member of the Tawa Lions Club for 44 years, he has been both president and Deputy District Governor.

For 25 years he was a volunteer for the Kapi Mana Police, primarily with phone contacts in Victim Support services. Terry admired the police staff who supported him as a volunteer. "They were fabulous, absolutely superb," he says.

Terry is a Senator and Life Member of New Zealand JCI Senators Inc, a Jaycee alumni group, and has been treasurer since 2002.

An active member of St Christopher's Church in Tawa, he has volunteered at Redwood School, initially as a Religious Instruction tutor, then for the past five years with the Bookworm Club. That collective of parents and grandparents works with students who are struggling or disengaged with reading.

A member of Tawa Indoor Bowls for 25 years, he was club captain for 17 years and president for two.

Terry joined the Tawa Midweek Table Tennis Club in 1992 and is the current treasurer, serving 20 years in that position.

## THE DEADLINE APPROACHES

Wellington City Council is seeking community feedback on the proposed 2020/2021 Annual Plan, which includes increased funding for the water network, and projects such as the new central city library network and planning for Let's Get Wellington Moving.

Mayor Andy Foster and Councillors agreed to go to consultation on a recommended 5.07 percent increase in rates for the next financial year.

Public consultation will conclude this coming Monday, 8 June.

The Council is seeking feedback from Wellington residents on two options for rates. The preferred option is the 5.07 percent rates increase and to borrow to cover revenue lost due to Covid-19 restrictions on Council facilities.

The other option is a 2.3 percent rates increase. This would result in big increases in future years.

## **PROGRESS WITH THE NEW PETROL STATION**

Resource consent was granted recently for "construction of an unmanned petrol station and associated earthworks at 26-28 Main Road, Tawa ....." The applicant is Waitomo Energy Ltd. The site adjoins the Outlet City carpark.

"There will be two vehicle access points, one from the roundabout on [the] Main Road where the vehicle crossing will form a fourth leg to the roundabout. The other vehicle crossing will be on the east boundary, providing access through to the Outlet City carpark for loading trucks which



will then utilise the internal access for Outlet City out to [the] Main Road."

We have no details as to when the new petrol station might be open.

EDITORIAL COMMENT: I was in Christchurch a couple of weeks ago. Most unleaded 91 petrol was in the low to mid \$1.70s range. This pic shows unleaded 91 in Redcliffs, Christchurch at 172.9/litre (before any discount). At the same time the same fuel in Tawa was costing 196.9/litre.

A quick look on the Gaspy app on Friday showed the lowest price in each of these centres: Napier 160.9; Christchurch 162.9; Invercargill 167.9; Dunedin 172.9; Hamilton 172.9; Whangarei 181.7; Wellington 183.8; Auckland 197.9.





## **MORE WATER TANKS IN TAWA**

People often tell us they've been meaning for a very long time to get their own 200L water tank! If you haven't already obtained yours, don't put it off any longer!

The experts tell us we should arrange for our *own* emergency water storage of 140L per person (based on 20L per day per person for seven days). The same 'experts' will ensure that water will be available in each Wellington suburb from day 8 after a major disaster.


When you join the meeting you'll be put in a "waiting room" and then manually let in. Everyone will be muted on entry.

Rotary members replace the baskets twice each year


with part of this, and the Tawa Business Group has previously made a generous contribution.

Jackson Lacy is the youngest of three new members elected to the Tawa Community Board in the October 2019 local body election.

Parts of his election profile read: "I'm a university student and a current member of the Wellington City Youth Council [since late 2016], and I'm running for the Tawa Community Board. I believe in smart solutions to the big problems we face, in a diverse, forward-thinking Tawa, that truly values young people.



I support sensible higher-density housing as a response to population

growth and the broken rental market. I support local solutions to the climate crisis, especially as parts of Tawa are already flooding. I believe in giving our most vulnerable people the help they need, so everyone is included in a vibrant Tawa."

Jackson is chair of the grants subcommittee on the community board, he is the portfolio holder for youth, and shares the community development role.

Where were you born? Wellington Hospital.

Where did you grow up?

Tawa, for all but my first six months.

Where were you educated?

First Hampton Hill Primary, then Scots College, and I'm now doing a BA in Māori Resource Management at Victoria.

How long have you lived in Tawa?

The overwhelming part of twenty years.

#### What do you like about Tawa? What would you like to see improved?

I really like our community spirit, the way we band together when things get tough, as we've just seen through the COVID-19 lockdown. I'd like to see us really focus on supporting our young and vulnerable people, reducing our environmental impact, and improving housing affordability.

#### What about family?

I'm the youngest of four half-siblings, my older brother living in Auckland and my older sisters in Australia – I'm a proud uncle five times over.

#### Work experience over the years .....

I'm predominantly a graphic designer by trade, mostly for print, but I've done plenty of video production, and I've been really involved with organising TEDxYouth events over the years.

What are your interests and hobbies?

I love playing and listening to music – I was in choirs all through high school – as well as cooking and going for bush walks.

#### Favourite sports team and/or sports person?

Phoenix home games are always fun, so I try to follow how they're doing, and our very own Sophie Devine is absolutely smashing it in the cricket.

#### Favourite musical group and/or individual singer?

I've been getting into Pink Floyd lately, and really enjoying their work, plus Lorde is amazing as ever.

What is your favourite holiday destination in New Zealand?

Great Barrier Island, northeast of Auckland – my dad built a bach up there decades ago, and I've been going there since I was a kid.

#### What accomplishments/achievements in your life give you the most satisfaction/pride?

Graduating high school, and being elected to the Community Board. The former was mostly satisfaction – Year 13 was a really stressful time for me and I worked really hard to get through it. Similarly, the [election] campaign was a big thing for me, but I'm now really proud to be able to serve the people of Tawa.

#### What are two or three interesting things about you that local people may not know?

I'm learning te reo Māori, I played football (badly) in high school, and I spent most of Easter weekend this year calling elderly people in Linden to see how they were going through lockdown.

What are two or three things you would like to do before you die?

Visit my whenua tūrangawaewae – the places my ancestors are from – in Ireland and at the top of Te Waipounamu;

Get married and start a family;

Learn to play the piano much better than I currently can.




