STILL TIME TO ARRANGE A GET-TOGETHER IN YOUR STREET

Most people enjoy the opportunity to meet with their neighbours. We get great feedback when people do: "On Sunday we had about 23 adults and 14 children and teenagers gather in our cul-de-sac, a perfect spot for a neighbourhood get-together. Everyone enjoyed themselves, getting to know their neighbours better and throwing about ideas on how to better keep in touch as neighbours. Many stories were shared of moving into the street and changes we have seen



over the years. All agreed what a great initiative Neighbours' Day was, and many are looking forward to getting together again in the future."

SMELLS FROM SPICER LANDFILL

A community meeting took place last month to discuss unpleasant smells in Tawa which appear to be coming from over the hill at the Spicer Landfill. Presenters at the meeting were Peter Keller, Solid Waste Manager at Porirua City Council; EnviroWaste representatives including Brendon Cribb, the manager at Spicer Landfill; Greater Wellington Regional Council representatives including Louise McKenzie, Resource Advisor - Compliance.

Approximately 20 community members were present, plus four Tawa Community Board members. We were told of the measures that are being taken to minimise/eradicate offensive odours emanating from the landfill. The authorities appear to be treating the problem seriously but, as was pointed out, those odours appear to be worse now than they were three or four years ago.

The Regional Council advised that the number of complaints they'd received in recent years have been increasing, but last year it averaged out at around only one per week. It was emphasised to them that people often didn't know who to call. The Regional Council indicated that they would make more

effort to let the community know it was they who should be contacted with any odour concerns.

Community members endeavoured to convey to the presenters how appalling, on occasion, the situation had become. It was hammered home that despite remedial action, the situation does not appear to be improving. The response of those in charge was that they will continue to do whatever they can to ensure it does improve. However many of those present were not entirely convinced that will happen any time soon.

One useful outcome from the meeting was the strength of feeling shown by community members affected by the smells, and this appeared to be taken on board by the Regional Council whose role it is to "monitor the situation".

It was emphasised on the night that every member of the community noticing an unacceptable smell should report it to the Regional Council *immediately*. A barrage of complaints will ensure a better response! It's fair to say that in the intervening weeks the Regional Council appears to have already made an effort to communicate better with complainants. Concerned residents will need to continue to liaise with the powers-that-be (and each other) until this issue is finally resolved!

HAVE YOUR SAY ON MEDIUM-DENSITY HOUSING IN TAWA

The Council has a responsibility to give the community what it needs and to make it possible for a variety of housing types to be developed. To achieve this, the Council is now planning to encourage more medium-density housing to be built in Tawa.

Your feedback is invited on two important parts of this plan:

- Where in your community would it be best to develop medium-density housing?
- What standards of design should the medium-density housing meet?

From Saturday 28 March until Saturday 4 April there will be a "drop-in centre" during library hours at

the Mervyn Kemp Library where you can share your views and learn more about medium-density housing and what it could look like in Tawa.

CURRENT BAN ON GARDEN SPRINKLERS (AND FIREWORKS)

From the WCC website:

"A total ban on outdoor fires – gas barbecues excepted – is now in force in the Wellington region. There is also a ban on the use of garden sprinklers and other unattended irrigation systems to conserve the region's water supplies.

Like much of the rest of the country, the Wellington region is tinder-dry after weeks of hot weather and a serious lack of rainfall.

The fire risk is now extreme so local councils and the Department of Conservation have imposed the total ban. The ban covers all territory in Wellington City, Hutt City, Upper Hutt City, Porirua City and the Kapiti Coast District. It includes all land administered by the Department of Conservation.

All fires in the open are banned. This includes cooking fires such as hangi, umu and braai, incinerators, solid-fuel barbecues, campfires, beach fires and fireworks.

REPLACING THE SHELTERS AT TAKAPU ROAD STATION

A notice currently in place at Takapu Road Station reads as follows:

As part of our improvement programme, we are replacing the shelters at Takapu Station with modern, bright ones. The current shelters will be removed on 15th March 2015 and construction of the new shelters is expected to be completed by the end of May.

Unfortunately there will be no weather protection while the new shelters are being built. We apologise for the inconvenience and thank you for your patience.

MORE PARKING AT TAWA STATION



Greater Wellington Regional Council has sent this message through:

Tawa Station commuters will soon have almost three times the amount of parking, with work having begun on a large new park and ride area. The area, next to the old Tawa Junction warehouses, will provide 109 carparks in addition to the existing 45.

The land will be fully developed, drained and landscaped and lighting will be installed. Commuters can look forward to the new park and ride opening by May 2015.

TAKE NOTE! - A NOTE FROM TAKE NOTE TAWA

Construction work is under way at Take Note Tawa to upgrade the seismic rating of the building. Currently the building meets the Wellington City Council seismic code for retail but not the NZ Post Kiwi Bank requirements.

Over the next couple of weeks work will be done on the exterior of the building, mainly on the south side (left of pic), concrete pillars with foundations being constructed and the rear walls strengthened. This will make access to the Private Boxes via the side door restricted at times. It will be necessary during the day for Private Box holders to access their Boxes via the shop.



In early April steel beams and cross bracing will be put in the ceiling space of the shop. This will be done outside opening hours and should have minimal affect on business.

We will try to keep any disruption, noise, etc to a minimum and we regret any inconvenience caused. Access to the construction site is prohibited. Please contact us if you have any issues.

A NOTICE FROM THE REGIONAL COUNCIL ABOUT ODOURS

Greater Wellington Regional Council has sent this message through to the Tawa community:

The Regional Council welcomes all odour reports to Environment Hotline 0800 496 734. Greater Wellington Regional Council is encouraging people to call its hotline to report odour from Spicer Landfill following an increased number of notifications over recent weeks.

The council runs a 24-hour environment hotline and an environmental regulation duty officer is always on call to respond. In most situations the duty officer will be able to be at the site within one hour of being notified. The duty officer also responds to calls about other environmental incidents which involve the contamination of land, water, air and the coastal marine area.

Calls to the environmental hotline are confidential but a name, address and phone number is asked for in case the duty officer needs more information and to update the caller on the investigation. To make a report, phone the environment hotline on 0800 496 734.

Observations about Tawa's 'remoteness'

Tawa is geographically removed from the rest of Wellington city. Most locals know that. Most also like the fact that it contributes to our special "village feel". On the other hand it also means that many Wellingtonians, especially those in the eastern and southern parts of the city, see Tawa as being "out there" somewhere, and "Why bother going there?"

There is definitely a 'disconnect' which sometimes works in our favour and sometimes doesn't.

Below are a few 'interesting' observations which tend to back up what has been stated above:

When driving southwards on SH1 towards Wellington, where is the roadsign indicating that you've reached Wellington? Is it on the outskirts of Tawa, Wellington's northernmost suburb, as you might expect? No, it's at the bottom of the Ngauranga Gorge. The whole of Wellington's northern ward has been bypassed before motorists are informed they've reached Wellington! Interesting.

Wellington Northern Suburbs

This from a supporter of the Island Bay cycleway: "The CBD already has [cycle lanes along] the waterfront from the railway station to Oriental Bay So far we have nothing in Wellington's suburbs. The nearest is Tawa and the Hutt River Trail." So, in the mind of this southern resident, Tawa isn't one of Wellington's suburbs! Interesting.

Greater Wellington Regional Council maps of Wellington city regularly exclude Tawa. Admittedly Tawa is in the Porirua-Tawa ward in terms of GWRC zones, but it may be that the Regional Council needs reminding that Tawa is still part of Wellington city. Interesting.

Two Wellington suburban newspapers cover, on the one hand, the eastern and southern suburbs and, on the other, the western and northern suburbs. The "Independent Herald" covers the latter, all the northern suburbs, with the biggest one, Tawa, being excluded. Interesting.

There are no doubt other examples of Tawa's "isolated state" which, as stated earlier, can work both for and against us. We'll finish with this anecdote from the last local body elections. Describing the suburb's remoteness, a certain mayoral candidate on making it all the way out to Tawa, was heard to exclaim "It's like the lost city of the Incas!". Well, who knows? Maybe it is and we just don't know it!
