# HANGING BASKETS TO BE 'REPLACED' SOON

As you probably already know, the flowers in the hanging baskets in the central Tawa shopping district are replaced every six months. The intention is to hang the latest round of baskets in place on the afternoon of Saturday 9 June.

The newly-established Tawa Potted Colour Committee has taken on responsibility for maintaining the baskets. They are also

hoping to ensure there is sufficient ongoing funding to meet the \$3000+ annual cost of keeping the baskets in place.

### **LED STREETLIGHTS**

There have been many concerns expressed about the dimness of the new LED streetlights in Tawa. That includes more than 100 comments on *Neighbourly,* mostly unfavourable.

Both Cr Malcolm Sparrow and Tawa Community Board member Graeme Hansen have been liaising with WCC's Team Leader Transport Infrastructure about the issue. We've been advised that "the LED lights have been installed at 50% brightness to avoid issues with glare when they are first activated. The brightness can be adjusted remotely and we have brightened some of the lights already."

We have been requested to provide details to Council on a street-by-street basis. Graeme has responded by compiling a list of around 25 'affected' Tawa streets (based on complaints received) which he has forwarded to Council. Their response: "In the next month we will engage a lighting survey specialist to measure lighting in the streets you've identified, and other similar streets. The specialist's report will provide information that will help us adjust the lighting to give better results."

Individual residents are also calling WCC's contact centre on 499 4444 with their concerns.

In a two-kilometre drive Malcolm took a few nights ago, he counted three street lights in the

southern half of Oriel Ave simply not working at all, one at the bottom of Redwood Ave and another four on the Main Road near Outlet City. Others were so dim that you had to be close to them to realise they were actually switched on. These have all been reported to Council.

#### **COMMUNITY EMERGENCY HUBS IN TAWA**

From the WREMO (Wellington Region Emergency Management) website:

"Community Emergency Hubs are located at local primary schools, community centres, and other community gathering spaces. WREMO has made arrangements with these hosts to allow locals to open up the venue in times of need.

Community Emergency Hubs [formerly known as Civil Defence Centres] are equipped with an operating guide to help describe the most efficient way to run the hub, a map, a small amount of stationery, and a



radio so the community can communicate with the official Emergency Operations Centre. There are NO caches of emergency supplies at Community Emergency Hubs."

There are four Community Emergency Hubs in Tawa: Greenacres School, Redwood School, Tawa School, and the one currently at the Linden Social Centre. NOTE: the Linden Community Emergency Hub is now in the process of being transferred to Linden School.
