BNZ DEPARTING TAWA

From Ant Simon, Chair, Tawa Business Group Inc:

We regret to inform you that the BNZ has announced the closure of their Tawa branch, effective 17 November 2017.

Greg O'Connor, our local MP, organised a meeting with two representatives of the Bank





of New Zealand involved in making the decision to close the branch.

The meeting was attended by representatives from Tawa Business (Ant Simon), Tawa Residents' Association (Tony Hassed), Tawa Community Board (Richard Herbert) and our three local councillors Jill Day, Malcolm Sparrow and Peter Gilberd.

Despite our best efforts, the bank would not be swayed in its decision to close the branch.

Two of the bank staff are being relocated to other branches and two have taken redundancy.

Our remaining bank service is a Kiwibank agency operated by Steve and Karen Pettigrew at Take Note.

NEW SURREY ST ROUNDABOUT

Great progress has been made on the construction of a roundabout at the intersection of the Main Road and Surrey Street.

Here is a portion of the letter Council distributed to locals regarding the work that would be carried out:

"The roundabout [at the intersection of Main Road, Tawa and Surrey Street] is an extension of the proposed Tawa Town Centre improvements and forms a gateway treatment to the area. It will slow traffic on entry to the shopping centre and improve safety for motorists and pedestrians using this busy intersection.

There will also be some modifications made to the roundabout at the intersection of Surrey Street and Oxford Street to improve accessibility for larger vehicles serving the local commercial centre and to free up more kerbside parking in the area.

In the final stage new road markings will be painted.

We expect work to be completed by the end of November / early December 2017."

TRUCKS IN WOODMAN DRIVE

There has been a recent complaint about Transmission Gully-bound trucks speeeding along Woodman Drive and "engine braking" where it is illegal to do so.

The matter was referred to Belinda Mackenzie-Dodds who is the Community Relations Manager for the Transmission Gully project. She promised to contact the relevant trucking company to request compliance with the law, i.e. don't speed and don't use engine brakes in a residential area.



NEW DEVELOPMENTS IN TAWA

There are currently several new "high-density" developments in Tawa – yet-to-be-started, currently under way, or newly completed.

Recently-completed is the Ranui Townhouses development in Handyside St, 15 architecturally-designed townhouses, each approximately 100 sqm, 3 bedrooms, and now sold out.

Then there is the project currently under way at Tawa Junction which will "..... create 29 new homes for low income families. It is part of the HASHA (Housing Accords and Special Housing Act 2013) which is intended to enhance housing affordability in certain regions."

At 4 William Earp Place (Takapu Island), there are currently a lot of earthworks being undertaken. See

photo at right. This is in preparation for a 26 one and two-bedroom unit development.

And approval has been given to a 13-unit development at 58 Raroa Tce, alongside Greenacres School. Council is currently responding to traffic safety concerns which may result from this proposal.

TAKAPU ISLAND DEVELOPMENT

Consent was given by WCC more than three years ago for a commercial development at Takapu Island at the southern end of Tawa.

The resource consent specifically allows for a café, a fast food store, and a certain amount of retail – as shown in this plan. However there has been little progress to date.

I (the Ed.) contacted the Auckland developers in the first week of November to

DESIGN INTENT

REV 3 CHANGES:

The internal carpark Nikaus are confirmed as small grade as opposed to transplanted mature specimens. In addition to numerous seating and shade opportunities between carpark and building frontages, Kowhai specimen trees have been located to further provide amenity and shade. A Secluded outdoor seating area is separated from the carpark and provides staff and customers a 'get-away' location. Ngaio specimen trees have been introduced on the western embankment to provide shelter from wind and give scale to time built form.

NORTHERN BOUNDARY AND ENTRANCE

The northern boundary is bordered by Countdown and its carpark. Pohutukawa trees have been introduced to mark the entrance in a shelltered spot to provide a high amenity experience for the patrons.

WESTERN BOUNDARY

The buildings on the western boundary will be softened by Metrosideros 'Maori Princess' specimen trees plus a secondary layer of screening planting. A visual corridor between buildings on the western boundary allows the development to connect into the wider landscape, inviting the rural character into the site.

EASTERN BOUNDARY

The eastern boundary runs parallel to State Highway 1 and NZTA road reserve, which is characterised by a large earth bund that partially conceals the development. To further reduce visual impact of the buildings, the western boundary will be softened by Metrosideros 'Maori Princess' specimen trees plus a secondary layer of screening planting.

SOUTHERN BOUNDARY

A significant portion of the southern boundary is currently heavily vegetated and a fair distance from the rural residence.

ascertain what was happening with the development. I was told that it is still in the pipeline but "funding is a determining factor We like to think it will be going ahead in the foreseeable future but it depends what commercial interest there is."

So for all of you who were hoping to pop up to Takapu Island within the next 12 months in the hope of procuring a Big Mac (or whatever might be available in the fast food store), that simply isn't going to happen! Maybe further down the track – but the reality is that we don't know at this stage who or what businesses are likely to be established at Takapu Island.
