6-STOREY RESIDENTIAL BUILDINGS IN YOUR STREET?

Council is required to change its current planning rules "to enable development of at least 6 storeys within 5 to 10 minutes walking distance of railway stations." This could have major implications for Tawa!

To discuss this with Wellington City Council officers and to find out more about "Planning for Growth" proposals, come and visit the Planning for Growth Pop-up at the Main Road Plaza on Friday 4th September, 12pm to 4pm, and Saturday 5th, 10am to 2pm. This event has been re-scheduled from an earlier date.

There will be information, visuals and an opportunity to talk to the team to find out what the Draft Spatial Plan means for Tawa.

PEST FREE TAWA AT THE LIONS MARKET THIS SATURDAY

During the COVID-19 lockdown there was a huge upsurge in reported catches of mice and rats from existing trappers. Maybe this was just because people were being more active in checking and rebaiting their traps while at home during the lockdown.

While catch reports have subsequently gone down again, not unusual during the colder winter months, there is expected to be a resurgence of pest numbers in the spring-time. To help combat this and to protect our indigenous birds and critters that frequent our backyards, Pest Free Tawa is encouraging residents to take up its offer of obtaining a tunnel trap for your own backyard.

Pest Free Tawa has a target of traps at 5% of households throughout Tawa, Grenada North and Takapu Valley, in order to maintain pest numbers at vey low levels. Help us achieve this target. That's about 1,000 households and we're currently at 520, so just over halfway.

Come and talk to us at the Lions Market on Saturday 5th September when we will also be joined by the Kereru Discovery Trust people who are giving away a free native tree to households to further help maintain bird life in Tawa and to promote the Annual Great Kereru Discovery Count later in September.

MORE PUBLIC LAND ON OUR WESTERN HILLS

This is part of a recent WCC media release:

"Wellington City Council has agreed to the generous gifting of land to be used as scenic reserve, adding ecological value and more diversity to the Outer Green Belt (OGB) in Tawa.

The 16,670m ²piece of land [off Peterhouse St] adjoining Te Ngahere o Tawa (Forest of Tawa) and Spicer Forest, has important natural forest remnants and has been identified as a Significant Natural Area under the draft District Plan review.

Mayor Andy Foster says on behalf of the city, he is deeply grateful for this generous gift from the landowner who wishes to remain anonymous.


"This land will be another valuable addition to our Outer Green Belt, which is already such a precious resource for the whole of Wellington. We've been steadily working to complete the OGB including with recent purchases of the adjacent Te Ngahere o Tawa and 268 Ohariu Valley Road. Today Wellingtonians and visitors enjoy the Town Belt established 180 years ago.


We also want people to be enjoying and appreciating the OGB in hundreds of years' time from now.

It'll help us to provide protection around this important landscape and eco-systems, as well as being a future seed source for restoration planting."

The owner has gifted it under the condition Wellington City Council will pay for the legal and survey costs required to make a separate title.

"Public ownership means we can better protect and restore the shared natural environment than under land covenant or District Plan provisions. The gift is something unprecedented – and we would like to express our gratitude for the generosity of the transfer."








NEW EMPLOYER RECOGNITION MARK AT TAWA FIRE STATION

KENEPURU CORRIDOR UPDATE

Porirua City Council has advised that the contract for construction of the Kenepuru Drive/Raiha Street roundabout has been awarded to Downer, with work scheduled to begin in September 2020.

Most construction will occur at night with completion in November 2020, weather permitting. All road users will need to take care while work is under way, and temporary traffic management will be in place.

Design work is under way on the following projects with construction scheduled to begin in the first half of 2021:

- Raiha Street/Broken Hill Road intersection
- Raiha Street/Prosser Street intersection
- Main Road/Wall Place intersection
- Kenepuru Drive cycle crossing point (approximately 100m south of Flooring Xtra)
