TAWA COMMUNITY CIVIC AWARDS

At a well-attended ceremony (120+ people) run by the Tawa Community Board earlier in June, the Deputy Mayor of Wellington, Ian McKinnon, presented certificates to those nominated for a Tawa Community Civic Award. MPs, city councillors, nominators and friends and family of nominees were at the Tawa Community Centre to lend their support.

"We received more than 40 nominations for individuals and groups that members of the community considered worthy of receiving an award," says Malcolm Sparrow, joint organiser of the awards.

The purpose of the civic awards is to publicly thank the many people in the community who are involved in a wide range of voluntary activities. "There is no doubt the commitment and dedication of these people make our community a better place in which to live."

Winners of each of the six categories, including the newly-added Youth category, received a framed certificate and native tree from the Deputy Mayor.

Be the first to hear about Wellington emergencies, e.g. tsunami warnings.

Sign up to receive Emergency Text Alerts from WEMO (Wellington Emergency Management Office, the "Civil Defence" people).

- The service is FREE, but signing up costs four texts under your normal price plan.
- We will send you two test messages per year. Any other message will be a genuine alert.
- Does not currently work on 2degrees.

Sign up to WEMO Emergency Alerts

(If your cell phone number is already registered on Twitter, go to step 4).

- 1. Text the word "start" to 8987 (wait for a reply after each send)
- 2. Text "signup" to 8987
- 3. Text username to 8987 * (if rejected or password requested, try again)
- 4. Text "follow WemoNZ" to 8987.

That's it - you're now on the Alert List. There's nothing more to do.

* You won't need to remember your username. Try using the first five letters of your street name plus birthday, e.g. Woodm020671.

TAWA SCHOOLS' & COMMUNITY FESTIVAL 2010

'Tawa Goes to Town' is again the theme for this year's Tawa Schools' and Community (Music) Festival which takes place in the Michael Fowler Centre on Thursday 16 September at 7.30pm. This vibrant multi-media show will feature several hundred singers from Tawa's six Primary Schools, Tawa Intermediate, and Tawa College's Dawn Chorus, as well as an adult choir from the Tawa community and beyond.

The programme features a variety of songs, some as choral numbers, whilst others are accompanied by dances, choralography, props and special effects. There will be solo, group and instrumental interludes between brackets of songs.

Tawa College musicians Murray Cameron and Shona Murray will team up as Producer and Musical Director, whilst well-known choreographer, Sara Scott, who choreographed Tawa College's successful production 'Standing Ovation' last year, will oversee the dance and theatrical numbers. Martin Burdan has been the 'piano man' since the festival was first held in the Michael Fowler Centre in 1982. The musical backing is provided by a combination of experienced instrumentalists and young and talented music students from Tawa College. The Convenor of the Festival is Pieter Braun, Principal at Redwood School.

Rehearsals with singers, dancers and instrumentalists have begun this month and will culminate in the dress rehearsal for the show on Sunday 12 September which will be the first time the combined forces will come together.

Adults rehearsals began two Sundays ago at 4.00pm in the Tawa College Hall. The cost for the festival music book and a CD is \$15. Any adults or ex Tawa College students may still be able to join the backing choir.

16-WEEK TAI CHI PROGRAMME

An ACC Modified Tai Chi programme is being provided at the Tawa Community Centre on Wednesdays at 1pm starting 30 June.

For people to receive the ACC funding they need to live in their own home, have either had a fall in the past year or are at risk of falling, and are 65 yrs+ or 55 yrs+ for Maori and Pacific Islanders.

This is a once a week for sixteen week programme (block course).

The focus of the programme is to reduce the risk of falls within this group of people. Enliven Positive Ageing Services focuses on the health benefits of the programme. The benefits include improved lower body strength and balance, postural and coordination.
