CONGRATULATIONS TO SHONA MURRAY



TAWA SUCCESS AT NZ DIVISION 2 SWIMMING COMPETITION

Tawa Swimming Club recently sent a small team of 7 swimmers to the New Zealand Division 2 Competition, held in Rotorua from 20-23 July. From the 71 clubs at the meet Tawa finished **3rd** overall!

The seven Tawa swimmers, Meghan Allan, Andrea De Atouguia, Mikayla McPhee, Ruslan Cowley,

Calvin Jones, Kurtis Imrie and James McCarthy swam 38 individual events between them and brought home 23 medals (5 gold, 7 silver and 11 bronze). Individual medal winners were: Meghan Allan (2 gold, 2 silver, 2 bronze), Andrea De Atouguia (5 bronze), Mikayla McPhee (3 gold, 2 silver) Kurtis Imrie (3 silver, 3 bronze) and James McCarthy (1 bronze). In addition James and Ruslan were part of the Wellington Regional Freestyle relay team which won silver.

Five of these swimmers who train out of Tawa Pool under coach Mat Woofe, will now join with other club members to swim at the NZ Short Course Championships being held in Wellington from 6th to 9th August.

KNOWING YOUR NEIGHBOURS

Around 70% of people in New Zealand think that it's important to feel a sense of community with other residents in their neighbourhood. That figure might be even higher in a place like Tawa.

There are different levels of "community connectedness". Which suits your street best?

• **POSSESSING A BASIC LIST:** At the minimum it makes sense for every "grouping" of 10 to 15 houses in Tawa to compile a list providing the names of the householders, their street number, phone number, cell phone number, possibly email address, and the number of people in each household. Each of the households in that group of 10 to 15 would have their own copy of the list. It would be for their use only. They would know the names of their neighbours, how to contact them, and how many people need to be accounted for in the event of a crisis.

• **LIST, PLUS ANNUAL OUTDOOR GET-TOGETHER:** This is the next step up. In addition to the basic list mentioned above, the residents of the previously-mentioned 10 to 15 houses would roll together 3 or 4 barbecues once or twice a year - either in someone's backyard, on the grass verge out the front or at the end of the cul-de-sac. There are some streets in which this is already happening.

The possibility of a couple of specific weekends each year, perhaps late November and late March, being promoted as **TAWA NEIGHBOURS' WEEKEND**, might provide the extra incentive for people to organise such a get-together in their own street. In fact all that would need to be done would be to encourage the other households in the street to join the occasion. Rather than individuals having their own barbecue at home, they would simply join together with a group of neighbours out on the street (so to speak). There is already a Neighbours' Day Aotearoa which takes place in late March. A whole bunch of streets in Tawa could be part of this next time.

• A FULL NEIGHBOURHOOD SUPPORT GROUP: This is the ideal in many respects but needs an enthusiastic coordinator to organise and keep the momentum going. It may well mean getting together 3 or more times a year in somebody's house. Many neighbours actually enjoy being part of such a group, but it does require one or two people to be the ones "in charge".

There are about 144 streets in Tawa and more than 4600 households. There is potential for more than 400 "neighbourhood groupings" in our wider community. At the minimum it would be great to see that number of "basic lists" in existence.

HERE'S A REAL-LIFE EXAMPLE IN TAWA:

"When we moved to Greenacres in January 1995, we got a knock on our door and the neighbours said we were the latest people to move in. One other family had recently moved in too so they were having a street barbecue to welcome us, which was really nice. It's a cul-de-sac, only 13 houses, so we all just drag small tables and chairs up to the top of the street and enjoy getting together. Those neighbours subsequently moved and we found ourselves organising the street barbecue. I encouraged another couple to help with this so our two families organise them now. In the winter, if someone moves in, we have a dessert evening at our home and those are very well attended too. If we have a spur-of-themoment (good weather) barbie, we often have it in the other couple's backyard. We stay out quite late in the summer evenings. It's really nice, people come and go when they can.

I have a register of all the phone numbers, including mobile and email addresses. Everyone gets an updated copy when we meet. Even when we send an email invite we always put a note in the letterboxes as well. We all do try to look out for one another, help with transport to doctors, hospital, child-minding etc. The children in the street know they can come to any of our homes and feel safe.

If you live in a street of more than say 15 houses, you don't need to invite the whole street, just the houses that are close to yours on either side of the street."
