TAWA PRIMARY SCHOOLS' CITIZENSHIP AWARDS

REDWOOD SCHOOL DUATHALON

More than 300 Redwood School students took part in the school's recent duathalon which featured four races.

Preschoolers biked though the Tawa Pool parking lot and then ran back to the start/finish line just before the entrance to the pool.

Years 1 & 2 ran though the pool parking lot, through City Operations to the bike transition area just north of Tawa Junction. They biked both sides of Tawa Junction then ran back the same route they'd come.

Years 3 & 4 ran through the rose garden at Grasslees Reserve, through the pool parking lot, through City Operations and then biked the same as above, but two laps rather than one of Tawa Junction.

Years 5 & 6 ran up Davies Street (from Tawa Pool), right on McLellan to Duncan Street, down Duncan Street to the overbridge, across the overbridge and through the back side of Tawa Junction. They then biked three laps around both sides of Tawa Junction before running back through City Operations and through the pool parking lot.

Funds were raised by registration fee, student sponsorship and event sponsorship.

Awards were given to 1st, 2nd & 3rd in each year group, both boy and girl. Other awards were given, including one to the child who raised the most money in each syndicate.

The race was successful because children of all fitness levels could participate, with 86% of students in the school registering. Each child received a medal, piece of fruit and bottle of water when they crossed the finish line, with lots of parents cheering them on. A great team of volunteers and teachers (over 100 in all) worked for months to make it a very successful event.

HANDYMEN

In our last newsletter we included the following from a reader:

"From time to time I need basic home maintenance work done around the place, and may not have the time or skills to do it myself. The problem is that standard tradesperson rates are just too expensive, and the jobs do not normally require that level of skill. Are you aware of anybody who may do this sort of general handyman work on a part-time basis, or over a weekend to earn some extra dollars, etc? If so, I'd be keen to hear about it."

We got three responses, one of whom wishes to remain low-key. The others were:

Stan's Handyman Services. Stan advises his rates are reasonable and that he offers discounts for pensioners. He can be contacted on 232 5431.

Eli (Bocs) Bocacao. He runs a VIP home services lawnmowing franchise, but "... has general knowledge on carpentry ... the 'affordable' but quality handyman you are looking for." His number is 232 4755.

WANTED BY THE TAWA POLICE

More volunteers are needed to assist at the Tawa Community Police Base. Volunteers are in charge of the office during their 3-hour duty period, while the Community Constable is out and about on crime prevention and investigation.

Good communication skills are essential and confidentiality is paramount. Duty shifts are 10am to 1pm or 1pm to 4pm. Volunteers can choose a day of the particular week and whether morning or afternoon. Full "on the job" training is given until solo duty commences, when any guidance required is always close to hand.

Being a police volunteer is one of the most worthwhile vocations in the community, with job satisfaction from helping Tawa residents and businesses a just reward.
