IS YOUR STREET JOINING IN?



We hope that by this stage you'll be aware that "Neighbours' Day in Tawa" is fast approaching. But the big question is ... **IS YOUR STREET JOINING IN?**

Neighbours' Day (or Neighbours' Weekend) takes place on 24-25 March. At the time of this being written we're pleased to report we have 35 streets in Tawa who have confirmed they'll be taking part – by hosting a street barbecue, lunch, afternoon tea or similar on (or near to) Neighbours' Weekend.

The residents in those streets will dine together, meet new people (ones who live probably only a few doors away) and very likely have a thoroughly enjoyable time.

However the fact is that, as things stand, more than 75% of the streets in Tawa will not be taking part in this special weekend. Much of the reason we're pushing Neighbours' Weekend to the extent that we are is "... to build community before we need one." That way of thinking is something positive that has come out of

the earthquakes in Christchurch.

It's not too late to join in! Basically all it takes is you and a neighbour agreeing to roll out your barbecues to the grass verge or to the end of the cul-de-sac and cooking and eating together. Others in your part of the street can be invited in person or by flyers in their letterboxes. Simple as that! What about you being the person who ensures it happens in your own street!

WIN A BBQ PACK FOR YOUR STREET



TAWA COLLEGE'S "REALISE THE DREAM" STUDENT

Adrina Venayagam was one of 19 secondary school students from around New Zealand selected for the Genesis Energy "Realise the Dream" event organised by the Royal Society of New Zealand in December 2011. Genesis Energy's "Realise the Dream" is a prestigious week-long event where students are rewarded for undertaking an outstanding piece of science research.

Adrina spent months working on her science project and this lead to her being selected for "Realise the Dream". She researched the effect of smoking on the human lung capacity, surveying 20 smokers and 20 non-smokers with a peak flow meter. Each participant took three vital breaths (a deep, hard blow) and three tidal breaths (a normal breath). Adrina found a major difference in smokers' and non-smokers' lung capacities - 10% of the smokers she



surveyed were in the danger zone when smoking, tar and chemicals damage the lung vessels.

During the week in December 2011 Adrina and the other participants travelled by coach from Auckland to Wellington. Activities included a day visit at the Liggins Institute, Auckland; Genesis Energy, Tokaanu; Dairy NZ, Hamilton and Massey University, Palmerston North. The week concluded with a cocktail awards evening at Government House in Wellington. Adrina said "The highlight of the trip was being able to learn about the science New Zealand has to offer."

TAWA POOL RE-OPENING DELAYED

The pool was closed last October for the roof to be replaced and for the pool's scheduled five year maintenance.

Although renovations were on track to be completed by mid-April, re-opening the pool has unfortunately been delayed.

We have been informed: "Although some earthquake strengthening was allowed for in the original contract and this has been completed, further work has been identified. This requires analysis by the engineer as it will need to comply to the new standards."

It could now be June or even later before the pool is re-opened.

TAWA VOLUNTEER FIRE BRIGADE CEREMONY

Cr Best and the chair of the Tawa Community Board attended a ceremony recently at the local fire station when medals and/or bars were presented by the Hon Peter Dunne, MP for Ohariu, on behalf of the Fire Service to local volunteer firefighters in appreciation for the service they provide to this community.

A banner on display in the fire station emphasises that the Fire Service is involved in a whole lot more than just fighting fires. It also entails Urban Search & Rescue, helping with cardiac arrest, storms and flood damage, hazardous substance disposal, as well as attending motor vehicle accidents. And it is carried out in Tawa all on a voluntary basis!



POSSIBLE DELAYS TO TAWA PROJECTS

The Council [has previously] confirmed funding for two artificial pitches in the northern suburbs, \$1.875m for Alex Moore Park in 2013 and \$1.45m for Tawa or Grenada North in 2014, designed to ensure an even geographical spread across the city. However due to financial constraints Council staff are now proposing to reverse the earlier agreement and push back Alex Moore Park by one year and Tawa/Grenada North by three years, despite protestations that the current situation severely disadvantages northern suburbs residents.

We'll let you know the outcome of this in due course.

Another proposal is to delay work on Tawa's Shared Walkway which will ultimately provide pedestrian and cycle access from Willowbank in the south to Porirua in the north. Whilst good progress has been made on this to date, the concern is that if it is stopped, it may never be started again. Again, we'll keep you informed of developments.

On a personal note

I'm very pleased that more than 30 individuals are interested enough in organising a barbecue (or similar event) in their own street in conjunction with "Neighbours' Weekend". These people see the value in getting to know their neighbours better and meeting those in their street they don't already know.

I read on the "Neighbours' Day Aotearoa" website of a 2008 survey which concluded that around 72% of New Zealanders are interested in getting to know their neighbours better. I'm not sure what that says about the other 28%! I guess there will always be those who don't feel the need to make 'friends' of their neighbours, or perhaps are very shy or maybe are just downright grumpy! A bit like the man who saw me put a "Do you know your neighbours?" brochure into his letterbox last week. My daughter and I delivered more than 2000 of those "Neighbours' Day Aotearoa" leaflets between us. I felt that the brochure should go into every letterbox, whether it stated "No Circulars" or "Addressed Mail Only" or whatever. Some reading this might think I should have respected that "Addressed Mail" request. However my reasoning was that no right-thinking person would say no to the assistance of a neighbour in the event of a crisis striking. Thus all would get the brochure, bearing in mind its content was simply neighbourly stuff. A different story if it had been an advertising flyer or a real estate promo or similar!

Anyway I heard an "Excuse me" after delivering to that "Addressed Mail Only" letterbox. I turned around and he said, "Excuse me, would you remove that." (He might have said "please". I can't remember). I responded quite sincerely, "Okay. Can I hand it to you in person?" "No," he said. Now if I'd been a fast thinker I would have asked him if he would have accepted the help of his neighbours in the event of a crisis. But I didn't. My question was somewhat more simplistic. "Are you interested in your neighbours?" was all I could muster. And unsurprisingly his response was "No". We left it at that.

Fortunately the majority of us have a more positive attitude to our neighbours. I would be 'wrapped' if that translated to a lot more people being involved in barbecues/get-togethers in their streets this coming Neighbours' Weekend!

And on a different note

The pup is now 16 weeks old (approaching four months) and sitting when she's told, staying when she's told (mostly), and usually coming on cue. We've made a huge amount of progress in the "house training" department too, but I'll spare you the details (other than to say I no longer have a whole lot of "cleaning up" to do when she gets up in the morning from her overnight slumber in the laundry.
