TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD INFO

THE FUTURE OF TAWA STATION

75 to 80 people attended a special meeting late last Sunday afternoon to hear "arguments" for and against the restoration of the Tawa Railway Station building.

Angus Gabarra and Cr Peter Glensor presented the Wellington Regional Council's viewpoint that the less expensive and less time-consuming option is to demolish the current building and replace it with a modern shelter costing around \$600,000.



Bruce Murray represented the Tawa Historical Society whose contention is that the building is one of the very few left in Tawa of any historical significance and is worthy of preservation.

Allan Dodson of the Plimmerton Residents' Association told us how his community had rallied together to restore their railway station.

There was agreement that maintenance of the Tawa Railway Station building has been sorely neglected over the years, but questions were asked about the veracity of the Regional Council's claim that it could cost \$1.5m to restore, with closure of the station for as long as 18 months.



The meeting ended with a "straw poll" of those present. Around 25% voted for restoration of the railway station. Of the two-thirds or so who voted for demolition and replacement with a modern shelter, some saw absolutely no merit in preserving a "derelict building", whereas others would like to have seen the station saved if possible but the projected cost of restoration and likely length of closure meant that they saw no alternative but to go along with the Regional Council's recommendation.

Where do we go from here? The Regional Council has indicated it will liaise with the Tawa Community Board in regards to the design of the replacement structure. Whilst this will ultimately be at the discretion of the Regional Council, it will consider some input from our end-of-the line (no pun intended). We'll keep you posted.

As a matter of interest, we have received 33 emails on this issue. The breakdown of those for and against has been pretty much consistent with the percentages above.

NEW WORLD SUPERMARKET UPDATE

The following has been sent to us on behalf of Foodstuffs:

George Sutherland, General Manager Brand, Foodstuffs Wellington, says New World Tawa is expected to open in early September rather than the anticipated July opening.

July was the original date but was subject to the realities of what contractors discovered once they gained access to the site following the end of the Woolworths' lease.

Once contractors had access to the site, they discovered more work was required than had been expected. The majority of this was related to structural, flooring and foundation improvements.

Asbestos was discovered in the building and this is not unusual for a building of this type and age. The site is now clean of the asbestos which was dealt with by industry experts as required by the Health and Safety in Employment Act and the Department of Labour. Asbestos on its own was not the reason for the delay. It was just one of a variety of factors that needed addressing in a building of this type and age.

New World as a brand is committed to providing a top quality environment for its customers and we regard a few extra months' work as acceptable in delivering on that commitment.

We ask for the Tawa community's patience, and trust that our alternative arrangements of the Temporary Supermarket in Tawa Mall and our bus service to nearby New Worlds continue to suit your grocery needs in the meantime.

COUNTDOWN PROGRESS

The community board has emailed Countdown asking where they're up to with their plans to construct their supermarket at Takapu Island. We'll bring you details once we've heard back.





On a personal note

The Southern Lakes district is superb in the autumn. I actually think it's superb most other times of the year as well. But its autumn colours are worth seeing, and that's the main reason Karen and I were there for six days at the very end of April.

The flight from Wellington provides great views of the Southern Alps, particularly Mt Cook, from the right hand side of the plane, and a brilliant outlook over Lake Wanaka before descending amongst the hills (quite closely really) and the golden colours below to touch down at Queenstown Airport.

We spent a few hours at Arrowtown on the day of its well-supported Anzac Day parade before a brief stop at picturesque Lake Hayes and onwards to Te Anau. After an overnight sojourn it was a 20-minute drive to Lake Manapouri the next morning to join our pre-booked excursion to Doubtful Sound. We hadn't been there before, and as it's no. 2 on the list of 101 places for Kiwis to see in their own country, it was a must-visit. There were 22 on our outing, foreigners slightly outnumbering North Islanders.

Lake Manapouri is claimed by many to be New Zealand's most beautiful lake. It is in a rather spectacular setting, and I can understand why it's "up there". It took us an hour by boat across the lake to reach West Arm and the Manapouri Power Station, NZ's biggest hydroelectric plant. It's not accessible by road although, once there, Doubtful Sound is reached by a shingle road from West Arm. But I'm getting ahead of myself.

We boarded a tourist coach (actually a "Japanese import" bus) driven by Toby, one of our two guides for the day, for the drive down inside the mountain to reach the actual power station. The Manapouri project was a huge undertaking in the 1960s, and creating a two kilometre access road through solid rock was a mammoth feat. A plaque inside the mountain remembers the 16 men who lost their lives during the whole project.

It took around 40 minutes to travel 18 kilometres over the Willmott Pass to reach the start (or end, if you prefer) of Doubtful Sound in one of the remotest spots in the country. We had one photo op en route before descending to the sound. Quite magnificent really, as seen in the photo.

The 3-hour cruise on the sound took us right out to the Tasman Sea for a glimpse of seals (not as close-up as at Cape Palliser) and, very fleetingly, a couple of dolphins on the return leg. Majestic surroundings however and worthy of the 150+ photos taken on the voyage. We get a little carried away sometimes.

The day's outing with Doubtful Sound Cruises took almost 9 hours in all, enhanced by a very informative commentary from young Toby who certainly knew his stuff. I'd recommend it.

On our way back to Queenstown the next day we stopped briefly to see the Kingston Flyer, the resurrected steam train, pulling in to its base at the bottom of Lake Wakatipu (so to speak). One of us stayed in the car to avoid the cold wind outside, the other braved the conditions to enjoy the spectacle and shoot off a number of photos.

Over the next few days we spent time in Glenorchy at the head of Lake Wakatipu (enjoying a very scenic

drive to get there), rode up the gondola for one of the world's best views and a few rides on the luge (a repeat of two years ago), and went with a commercial operator into Skipper's Canyon (on a narrow and rather "scary" road with big drops below) for a jetboat ride on the Shotover River. Great fun but not long enough.

I've said it before - that part of the country is probably my favourite and I very much enjoy going there. Unfortunately that isn't often enough.
