# TAWA POOL OPEN AGAIN (AT LAST)

The Mayor of Wellington, Celia Wade-Brown, has been in our neck of the woods again – this time to re-open Tawa Pool on Saturday 17 November, after it had been closed for 13 months for refurbishment, a new roof and earthquake strengthening.

The pool originally opened in the 1970s. Participants at the re-opening were invited to dress in 1970s gear, and a small number made the most of the opportunity to do so, as in some of the pics below. Proceedings began with a Maori welcome involving children from local schools. Graeme Hansen, representing the community board, then invited the Mayor to officially re-open the updated complex. Many of the large number present eventually made the most of the opportunity of a free swim.

# **MORE ABOUT TAWA POOL**

It was the community who rallied together in the 1970s, with the support of the then Tawa Borough Council, to build



Tawa's own swimming pool, despite stiff opposition. The organising committee went by the name of TOPA – Tawa's Own Pool Appeal. Two surviving TOPA stalwarts, Ian Greenwood (left), and Murray Jensen, were present at the re-opening ceremony.



Today's community owes them a great deal for what they achieved despite the odds.

# PAINTING OF THE MURAL

On the same weekend as the pool re-opening, a mural was painted on the wooden fence alongside the skatepark at the back of the pool complex. Feel free to go and check it out for yourself!

Artist Xoe Hall worked in partnership with the Challenge 2000 youth organisation and a group of young people from the northern suburbs, three of whom attend Tawa College.

The mural design includes skateboarding dogs hanging by the pool, watching shark and fish tale skateboards splash around in the water. It is made up of bold colours and black line work, and has key references to Tawa – 232 and the Pink Pineapple bakery's fried chicken.

# YOU CAN SUPPORT KIWI COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE

Kiwi Community Assistance has been nominated by Tawa New World for "Anchor Growing Communities".

Here's how it works. Anchor has allocated funds to local supermarkets around New Zealand, to be distributed amongst three local community projects of the supermarket's choice. Over a three month period (starting this month), customers who visit the supermarket are given the choice of these three local causes to donate to. When a shopper purchases Anchor Milk they will be given a token, which they then place in a specially designed token box for the cause they wish to support. At the end of the period, the money is distributed proportionally according to the number of tokens each cause receives.


So if you're buying Anchor Milk, please keep Kiwi Community Assistance in mind.

# **MORE MEMORIES OF TAWA**

"When I was a postie in the late 1960s I would usually have a drink at the dairy at the top of Ngatitoa St – actually it's probably Larsen Cres since it is beyond The Drive. That dairy was also the place where an overflow bag of mail was left when there was too much to carry in one load from the Post Office in the Main Road. It was later a dance studio for a while. The building is still there. It was always attached to a house so has become part of it.

The dairy in Bell St was similarly useful to the postie.

I don't think there was ever a butcher shop in Lyndhurst Rd – Lincoln Ave perhaps. And yes, definitely one in Bell St next to the dairy.

My memory of Friday night shopping was going with Dad to the dairy in Main Road just south of Oxford St (half the shop that it currently is) and buying malt extract for home brew. It was kept in a large barrel and Dad re-filled his 7-pound tin. On cold nights it seemed to take forever for the thick goop to drain out of the barrel.

Saturday morning at Jardens' hardware was very busy in the 1960s. They had a special licence to open Saturday morning – they had to close Wednesday afternoon to compensate. There were many handymen developing their houses and the only time they could get to the hardware shop was Saturday morning."

# **REGULAR BREAK-INS TO CARS AT REDWOOD STATION**

**From the Ed:** Vehicles parked at Redwood Station are broken into all too often. The most recent *Kapi-Mani News* records 12 vehicles in Tawa being broken into in the period 1-14 November, eight of those at Redwood Station. The number of vehicles broken into throughout the whole of Porirua in the same period was six.

It hit close to home when a family member's car was one of the statistics at Redwood Station at the end of last week. The rear right window was smashed and, in the process of the offenders trying to hotwire it and presumably steal the vehicle for parts, the ignition was wrecked. The car was left undriveable although nothing was taken from inside it.

Let's put it bluntly. People who do this sort of thing are scumbags with absolutely no concern for others! Unfortunately they are out there, and somehow we have to prevent them doing what they do. It doesn't help that cars are parked in relative isolation at this station. Nor that there seem to be no CCTV cameras there. We need to pursue that aspect further, and we will.

Another possibility is to look into community patrols at Redwood Station. However that would require an awful lot of people if the station is to be monitored 8 or 9 hours every weekday.

If your vehicle has been broken into at Redwood Station in recent months or you simply wish to express your opinion, please let me have your feedback or comments. It certainly isn't a pleasant experience for anyone to return to their car after a day at work and find that it's been broken into. What should we be doing to ensure this doesn't keep happening?
