TELL COUNCIL – IT'S IMPORTANT THAT YOU DO!!!

If it's important to YOU that Tawa retains an effective 'voice' into the future, it is important that YOU tell the Council that! There's a very simple method outlined below.



With the proposed changes to local government in the Wellington region, in future days there may be no community board to represent Tawa. There may or may not be an adequate replacement.

TAKE 2 MINUTES TO MAKE YOUR VIEWS KNOWN.

You could complete the official submission form which has more than 20 questions. To fill in the questionnaire, go to http://haveyoursay.regionalreform.org.nz/ That could take several minutes which is fine if you're happy to do that.

However a quick and simple option is to

Email info@regionalreform.org.nz with your views.

One or two sentences may be all it takes. You could say something like this:

"I do not have strong views on the amalgamation issue but I believe it's important that, whatever happens, Tawa does not lose its community voice."

ALTERNATIVELY you could say:

- "I support option 1"* and, if you wish, give a brief reason for doing so, OR say
- "I support option 2"* and, if you wish, give a brief reason for doing so, OR say
- "I support the status quo with improved efficiencies" and maybe give a brief reason why

IN EACH INSTANCE go on to say something like this:

"Whatever happens, it is important to me that Tawa people still have a strong community voice."

You will need to provide:

- your first and last names
- · your email address
- please also say you're from Tawa

WELL DONE TAWA ON SUPPORTING OUR MEETING!

Around 125 people attended a recent Tawa community meeting on the question of 'amalgamation' and where the Tawa Community Board might fit into the mix.

Bruce Murray from the Tawa Historical Society gave a short overview on the history of local government in Tawa. This was followed by Brian Hannah from the WCC giving a presentation on the Regional Governance Reform options (otherwise known as 'amalgamation' proposals).

When a straw poll was taken at the end, there was minority support for options 1 & 2 – both involving a single council across the region). The overwhelming majority indicated their preference for the status quo.

When the question was asked whether we'd like to be part of a Wellington ward (as we are at present) or part of a new Porirua ward, the overwhelming majority indicated their preference for the Wellington option.

When a public meeting organised by the Porirua City Council on the 'amalgamation' issue was held in Cannons Creek a few days before the Tawa meeting, around 30 people turned up, of whom approximately half were Councillors or Council officers – according to an article in the Kapi-Mana News.

Tawa Community Board members Malcolm Sparrow and Robert Tredger attended a similar meeting in Titahi Bay last week. There were 33-34 people at that, with at least ten from the Council.





This week the same two board members, as well as Crs Ngaire Best and Justin Lester, were at a "Regional Governance Reform" meeting (the same issue again) in Johnsonville, run by the Wellington City Council. That was attended by 25 people, about one-third of whom were "from the Council".

To get 125 people (very few of whom were "from the Council") at the Tawa meeting was, quite simply, a brilliant turnout! Thanks everyone for your support.

WATERING THE HANGING BASKETS

As reported in our most recent newsletter, around 35 people indicated their willingness to be involved in manually watering our hanging baskets when the Council's ban on all outdoor watering was in place.

As it turned out, we drew up a roster with four different people watering the plants each evening, and the Wednesday Guides taking charge on Wednesday evenings.

With the watering ban being lifted last week, our automated irrigation system has now been switched back on again.

Thanks to all those who played a part in keeping the flowers alive!

UPDATE ON TAWA STATION

The new-look Tawa Station will re-open on Monday 20 May.

The brand new station building features a range of distinctive panels showcasing Tawa's rail history and unique natural environment. As well as decorating the station the panels protect waiting passengers against wind and rain.

Along with the new building the station platforms have been strengthened and repairs have been carried out on the overhead pedestrian bridge.

Footnote:

The roof for the new station has been constructed in the station carparking area. It is likely to be lifted into place next week, but this will be dependent on the weather.

The panels featured below will line the outer walls of the new station. A plaque, or similar, will provide details of what each picture is. Some are more obvious than others.



TAWA PRIMARY SCHOOLS' CITIZENSHIP AWARDS

A community board representative has recently visited each of Tawa's six primary schools, plus the Intermediate, speaking to the senior students about the Tawa Primary Schools' Citizenship Awards and encouraging the Year 6 (or Year 8) students in each school to strive to be the winner of the award.

Each session was 7-8 minutes long and was "visually enhanced" with a billboard of last year's winners (as in the pic at right being shown to Hampton Hill students), along with the wooden shield located in each school's office block.

The shields list the names of successive years' winners, with the awards having started in 2011. The ceremony itself will take place at the end of November with Mayor of Wellington presenting the award to each winning student.

This will be her third year competing in the event, and this time she will be getting her hair shaved off in the hope of raising a lot for the charity. It is currently about


half a metre long (see the photo).

ANZAC DAY OBSERVANCE THURSDAY 25 APRIL 2013

TAWA CEMETERY WORKING BEE

A team of 12 volunteers spent the best part of two hours last Saturday morning clearing a lot of overgrowth from the back of Tawa Cemetery.

Most of the cemetery is well maintained. It was

A few hidden gravestones were uncovered including that of Henry Francis Hooper who died in July 1891 at the age of 38, and his wife Elinor Susan who died in April 1938 at the age of 85 (photo at left). That gravestone was lying flat and completely covered with vegetation and soil. Satisfying to bring it to the light of day again.

YOUNG SPEECHMAKER CONTEST

The Lions Clubs of New Zealand offer youth 16-20 years of age the opportunity to participate in a public speaking competition. Entrants must have attained seventeen years of age and not have had their 21st birthday by **1 December 2013.**

Entrants will be required to deliver a prepared speech of not less than five minutes or more than six minutes. The topic is at the discretion of the contestant. Penalty points apply for under and over time. An additional impromptu speech of not more than two minutes on a topic determined by the judges will also be delivered by each contestant. Penalty points apply for over time.

District Finals will be held throughout New Zealand on a weekend late May - end June 2013 to determine two winners per district. These winners will travel to the National Finals in Auckland on **17 August 2013**. All travel to the Finals is at the expense of New Zealand Lions Clubs. The National Finalist will be required to deliver the two speeches as aforementioned. The National Final will be held in Auckland on **Saturday 17 August 2013**.

An overall National winner will be determined at this contest and their prize will be a four to six week trip to the United States/Canada. Air travel, accommodation and meals will be met by Lions Clubs International and our sponsor. 1st Runner Up will receive a trip to Australia and 2nd Runner Up will receive a placement at the Lions International Youth Camp at Rotorua in December 2013/January 2014.

BUYING LOCALLY?

You've possibly seen the front page of this week's Kapi-Mana News to do with the local butchery closing down. According to the report, the butchery owner isn't happy that his business hasn't had the support it has needed in recent months to survive. "It's almost like the community isn't a community here. They don't support local," he says.

Is buying locally a part of what makes a thriving community? It may be part of the equation, but only one part. In my opinion there is a whole lot more to what constitutes a 'real' community than just that aspect. Many, if not most, Tawa people would agree that this is a great community in which to live. There's a lot of 'connectedness', there's a vibrant community spirit, more streets in Tawa got together for "Neighbours' Day" than anywhere else in Wellington, etc, etc. The word 'community' (in a positive light) comes through repeatedly in feedback I receive.

But back to buying locally. It's not necessarily a straightforward issue. I think that most people make their purchasing decisions based on convenience and price, and not necessarily in that order. The reality is that it's obviously more convenient to buy meat, fruit & vegetables, and a Lotto ticket when making other purchases at the supermarket, than to visit four separate stores. Presumably that's what most people do and that's what has resulted in the downturn for the butcher with two local supermarkets now up and running.

It's a cruel business world out there. For the sake of the Main Road retailers I wish it was different. I don't buy Lotto tickets but I like to think I would make the effort to support a certain long-established local Lotto store if I did. Easy to say, I guess.

Then there's the business of which supermarket to support. There are people, my family included, who do most of their grocery shopping at New World Tawa because, amongst various other reasons, that supermarket is at the heart of our community (at least geographically) and I suspect that, on the whole, the centre of Tawa would be considerably worse off without it.

I also give the owners of that supermarket credit for supporting the community with their temporary store for the 11 months Tawa was without a supermarket last year. And I recall a free shuttle bus service being provided to a full-size supermarket for those without transport. The Tawa community has also been provided with BBQ packs as prizes for Neighbours' Weekend in Tawa. For me the word 'loyalty' features in there somewhere, although no doubt there will be those who would regard that way of thinking as simply being naïve. I also believe there are instances in which that supermarket could have done things better, so I certainly do not have a blind allegiance.

I'm aware that a certain number of people leave the area to do their grocery shopping in Porirua. Presumably that's all about price. I think it has little to do with convenience or service, or a "pleasant shopping experience". Fair enough. Like most people, I don't like paying more than I need to and therefore endeavour to shop strategically, buying when on 'special', etc.

I received an email last week from one local resident concerned about the butchery closing, and asking what we as a community could do to support it. At that stage it was simply too late to even think about it.

But is there anything concrete we can do to support local businesses? I could harp on in every edition of this newsletter, encouraging people to buy locally. Would that make an iota of difference? Probably not. Some of us might make a concerted effort to buy locally (in the same way that some of us patronise a certain local supermarket). That might help a little. I'm really not sure what the answer is.

As the article in the *Kapi-Mana News* says, "Loyal customers are a huge help but Tawa small shopkeepers need to band together to attract new custom ... a plan could be formulated to turn Tawa into a shopping destination like Petone." There's merit in that. Maybe the Tawa Community Board and Main Road retailers need to get together to talk. We have to start somewhere!
