PROGRESS ON THE PATHWAY

The Tawa Valley Pathway – Ara Tawa is an ongoing project. It has been completed between Redwood Station in the south and Linden Park in the north, but there's still a substantial amount to be constructed at both ends.

Whilst the community board has been fully supportive of this project, all the credit must be given to the Tawa Shared Walkway Committee who have worked closely with the Wellington City Council in bringing it to where it is now.

The following update has come through recently from the Council:

"We are pleased to advise that construction has started on the next section of the pathway and is intended to continue through until it is completed in Willowbank Park. Work to be undertaken includes:

1. Commencement of construction of the path from Keneperu Station south, on the east side of the stream to Linden Park. This work started on 20 May 2013.

2. Commencement of construction of the path from Redwood Station to Willowbank Park is expected to commence early June.

3. The contract for construction of the bridge over the stream at the north end of Linden Park has been awarded. Construction is expected to start late in June once materials are sourced.



4. Construction of the part of the path skirting Linden Park will be undertaken during September and into October, after the hockey season has finished and before the start of the cricket season. This has been scheduled to occur during the spring renovation period, to minimise the impact on the hockey and cricket seasons. However it is likely that some trees will be removed prior to this along the stream bank to allow for speedy construction during this limited time period.

5. Design work on a bridge to cross the stream at the Willowbank Park end of the pathway is in the detail design phase."



TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD INFO (contd) OFFICIAL OPENING OF TAWA STATION

The new-look Tawa Station was officially opened last Thursday evening. A short ceremony took place, beginning with a Maori blessing of the new building. GWRC Councillor Peter Glensor MCed festivities and thanked GWRC officers for the great job they'd done, and also KiwiRail and NZTA for the part they'd played.

Malcolm Sparrow spoke briefly on behalf of the Tawa Community Board, as did Bruce Murray on behalf of the Tawa Historical Society. A dance troupe from Tawa College performed a dance routine to wind up proceedings.

The community board is appreciative of having been given the opportunity to work closely with the Greater Wellington Regional Council on the plans for the new building, particularly in regard to the 16 panels on the outside of the new structure. The designs on those panels feature the history of Tawa Station, rail travel through Tawa, and local flora and fauna including the iconic bucket tree and floral TAWA sign.

Trading gumboots for jandals is just one of the many changes young local woman Kyla-May Burkinshaw is now facing.

The former Tawa College student was one of hundreds of New Zealanders who applied to Camp Counselors USA (CCUSA) to work as a summer camp counselor in America this winter. Kyla-May, who has been placed by CCUSA at a camp in Arizona, is thrilled to have found a way to earn money at the same time as having an OE.

"I'm so excited to head to Camp Maripai, I can't wait to meet people from all around the world and experience life in a different culture!" she says.

Escaping New Zealand's winter and heading over for an American summer is a welcome bonus too. She will have time off during her camp placement, as well as thirty days following camp to explore the USA.

The camps, which are located right throughout the USA, are always seeking enthusiastic young Kiwis keen to participate on the CCUSA program.

"We send several hundred Kiwis over to summer camp annually and with around 1000 CCUSA camps to staff, we just can't get enough!", says CCUSA Country Director Liz Andrews. "Most of our camps are looking for skills that New Zealanders tend to have a lot of experience in anyhow from their own childhoods such as sports, performing arts, outdoor adventure, water sports and so on."

Kyla-May Burkinshaw credits CCUSA who have been with her "every step of the way" before heading off on her amazing journey, and will continue to support her with advice and assistance once in the USA too.
