THE STORM'S EFFECT ON TAWA

We're all aware of the storm which swept through much of the country last week and hit Wellington with a fury on Thursday evening, downing trees overnight and cutting power to thousands of homes.

Many households in Tawa, especially those on the flat and on the eastern side were in the dark for 12-15 hours or more. Several local schools were closed on Friday. In the case of Tawa College it was due to having no electric power. At others it was a matter of not all staff being able to get to school. Can't really have children there without teachers!

The Tawa Volunteer Fire Brigade was busy with a big number of callouts – the busiest 24-hour period they've ever experienced! Once again we're very grateful for the work they do for the community, on this occasion all through the night in very unpleasant conditions.

It's taking time to clear all the various fallen trees and repair other damage. Tawa Terrace was cut off with trees lying right across the road, Willowbank Road/Middleton Road was closed for three days, and large pine trees were blown over at the southern end of Willowbank Park. The Council page in yesterday's





DomPost featured a photo showing damage to a pedestrian bridge at Willowbank. There were lots of "lesser" incidents as well, such as damaged fences and displaced trampolines.

THE PASSING OF ALLAN TODD - TAWA'S "ELDER STATESMAN"



"Allan Todd called to higher service" – that was the heading in Tawa Rotary's most recent newsletter, describing the passing last week of Allan Todd.

At the Tawa Community Civic Awards in July 2008 a special category of "Excellence in Community Service" was created for the sole purpose of recognising a person who was described by one of those nominating him as being "into everything". It was said at the time, "If Tawa had an elder statesman, he would fill the role admirably" – an apt description of a key figure in the Tawa community. Our condolences to his wife Marjorie.

With the backing of Rotary, Allan set up a committee about 12 years ago to establish U3A in Tawa, a group which provides a great service for almost

500 mostly older local people. He was involved with Rotary (and was president in the 2006/07 Rotary year), Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves, the men's group at the Union Church which he organised, and he had also been a Tawa Community Police Volunteer. Allan was active with the Wellington Male Voice Choir, Redwood Club, the Tawa Historical Society, and regularly volunteered with Tawa Rotary's major fundraiser at the Stadium.

TAWA COMMUNITY BOARD INFO

NO BINS AT TAWA STATION

It's been asked why there are no litter bins at Tawa Station (or other local railway stations for that matter). Where do commuters finishing their coffee discard their empty cups? The answer is that we need to take them with us to dispose of elsewhere.

Between KiwiRail and the Regional Council there is a policy of no bins at stations, other than manned stations.

The chair of the Tawa Community Board,

Malcolm Sparrow, met recently with the Security Manager for KiwiRail at Tawa Station to discuss this specific issue and to ask about the possibility of tidy Kiwis having somewhere at the station to dispose of unwanted rubbish. As anticipated, the answer was no.

The three main reasons for the "no bin" policy are these:

- people dispose of household rubbish in these bins at great cost to the station operator
- there is a substantial cost incurred over the course of a year in emptying them
- because of their isolation, fires are sometimes lit in the bins, and that's not good

As a matter of interest, the station is checked by the cleaning company on a daily basis and "tidied" when necessary.

MEETING WITH LOCAL BUSINESS PEOPLE

A number of local business people have been getting together in recent weeks to discuss how to encourage Tawa people to better support local businesses and to determine what strategies might be put in place to boost Tawa as a shopping destination. The meetings to date have been initiated by the Tawa Community Board.

Representatives from Tawa Rotary are also involved. It's in the interests of the community as a whole to see local businesses prosper, thus the need to get together to work out ways of making this happen. Some useful ideas have already emerged which are likely to be put into action shortly. As they say, watch this pace.

WELLINGTON CITY YOUTH COUNCIL 2013

Congratulations to Erin Lockhart of Year 10 at Tawa College on her selection earlier in the year for the WCC Youth Council of 2013. Erin sent off her application, went through the interview process along with 57 other applicants, and was one of nine students chosen to join the Youth Council this year. She has already been to two meetings and participated in a Youth Alcohol strategy workshop at Te Papa.


From the Editor
