THIS 'N' THAT

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLANNING

Certain community board members are part of a group of local "stakeholders" who have had a series of meetings over the past two or three months with the view of drawing up a plan of action specific to Tawa, i.e. how we would handle the situation in our suburb in the event of a major disaster.

Last weekend's quakes were a timely wake-up call and reinforced the need to know exactly who would do what, should the "big one" (or any other natural disaster) ever strike us. Once we have something more concrete, it will be delivered to each local household in the form of a brochure – an emergency preparedness plan specifically for the wider Tawa community.

SPEAKING OF EARTHQUAKES

An authority on the subject has suggested that Tawa is possibly one of the safest places in the Wellington area in which to be in this situation. Reports of damage here have actually been pretty minimal, limited as far as we are aware to an occasional spillage here and there, a small number of items from supermarket shelves, books and DVDs hitting the floor, a spilled woodpile, etc. Certainly could have been a lot worse! As has already been stated, a timely reminder that we do need to be prepared!

FULL-SIZE WATER STORAGE

If you want to store a sizeable quantity of water, you can now acquire a 200L potable tank, thanks to WREMO (Wellington Region Emergency Management Office). The package includes a 200L water tank, quality diverter system, strapping, hooks, brass tap and bung, pre-drilled holes plus warranties and installation instructions.

The tanks can be bought for \$105 at both Porirua City Council i-Site, 8 Cobham Court, Porirua, and Wellington City Council Service Centre, 101 Wakefield Street, Wellington. They're designed to provide water for drinking in an emergency (although boiling first is recommended), and for the garden in the event of a drought!

PINE TREES AT WILLOWBANK

You may have seen the article on page 3 of this week's "Independent Herald" about lack of

access from Taylor Tce to Takapu Road station as a result of the large pine trees that were blown down at the southern end of Willowbank Park during the storm last month.

The Council has now advised that a contract has just been agreed for the work of removing the fallen trees to begin this coming Monday 29 July. It is estimated that the entire job will take three weeks. Access through the park will be limited through the work. It is hoped that initial access for commuters should be available from the middle of next week.

MISPLACED REAL ESTATE AGENT SIGNS

It appears that some real estate agents have started placing For Sale signs some distance away, sometimes several streets away, from the actual property they're selling. Those that have sprung up around Tawa have been placed there by "outside" agents from a certain company. We need to add that none have been placed by local agents.

Please let us know if you see such signs in places they shouldn't be and, if it's Council land, we will ask them to remove them. We've already taken such action in one instance.

EXPRESS YOUR CONCERN ABOUT THE LIGHTING ON THE PATHWAY

We mentioned in the last issue of this newsletter that concerns had been raised about the lack of lighting on the segment of the Tawa Valley Pathway – Ara Tawa between Redwood and Tawa Stations.

The solution may be some sort of low subdued lighting. However the "powers-that-be" have indicated that will only be considered if enough people indicate it's important to them. This may not have been made clear last time!

This year's "Spring into Tawa" Market Day will take place on Saturday 14 September.


