MORE CONGRATULATIONS TO TAWA

As you will have already read (unless you avoid the sports section of *The Dominion Post* and the front page of *Kapi-Mana News*), Tawa won the Jubilee Cup this past weekend for the first time in their 66-year history by beating Oriental Rongotai 26-21 on Sunday.

The Tawa Rugby Football Club was established in 1947 and had not won a major



prize until this year. In one season Tawa has won the Swindale Shield (presented to the top Wellington rugby club side at the end of the first Premier round), the Andy Leslie trophy (presented to the top Wellington rugby club side at the end of the second Premier round), and now the Jubilee Cup. An incredibly successful season and well worthy of congratulations!



The team was well supported by Tawa people at the final with three coachloads heading out to the Hutt Recreation Ground in addition to many in private vehicles. And rumour has it that those immediately caught up in the occasion were still buzzing the following day, Monday, to the degree that most chose to take the day off as they gradually descended to earth again.

The possibility of a local parade in the near future is being investigated. It'd be great way for the community to congratulate the team. We'll keep you informed.

ROTARY BOOK FAIR



Gross takings for this year's Tawa Rotary Book Fair were just over \$20,000, with expenses of around \$1800 (mostly promotional costs) yet to be deducted. Around half of the proceeds go to support Life Education Trust, the remainder to other (mostly local) charities.

Another great fundraising effort on the part of Tawa Rotary and, in particular, Doug Burrus (pictured – the one on the right) who was officially recognised by the

community at last year's Tawa Community Civic Awards. He's been the main organiser of the book fair for the past several years.

TAWA HISTORICAL SOCIETY AGM

The Tawa Historical Society will be holding its AGM at 7.30pm on Monday 26 August in the old Council Chamber, Tawa Community Centre, Cambridge Street, Tawa.

Following the formal business of the AGM (Chairman's Annual Report, Annual Financial Accounts and Statement, and election of officers), a well known personality with a long Tawa background, Newstalk ZB's Jason Pine, will present his view of growing up in Tawa in the 1970s and 1980s. FREE HORTICULTURE TRAINING PROVES POPULAR

An innovative distance delivery programme is proving to be a popular choice of horticulture study among small block owners, gardeners and horticulture enthusiasts.

The NZQA accredited National Certificate in Horticulture Level 3 and Level 4 run by the Taratahi Agriculture Training Centre, offers a good mix of theory and practical skills in the field of horticulture.

This free learning programme can be studied in your own home both online and paper-based. The mixed mode delivery allows you to access the course material and assessments online or in paper format. Students have the flexibility to fit their studies around their lifestyle.



The programme is structured such that support is provided to students by their Learning Facilitator through the monthly Saturday workshops, email, or telephone depending on the needs and location of the student.

"The course is very flexible, easy to follow, and learners enjoy the advantage of studying at home and in their own time," according to Learning Facilitator Dr Misael Diputado (pictured above) who has a PhD in horticulture from Massey University and vast research and practical knowledge of the industry.

The minimum age is 18 years and there are no minimum qualification requirements for mature students aged 20 years and above. Level 3 certificate is run over 12 months and level 4 over 16 months part-time.

A number of learners from Tawa have already benefitted from the programme since 2009.

THE MAYOR TO PLANT A TREE IN TAWA ON SUNDAY 18 AUGUST

You may have noticed a slow but sure return of native bird species to some of the residential areas around Tawa. Kereru (wood pigeons), tuis, fantails, silvereyes, morepork, even bellbirds and kakariki have been seen around the suburb in recent years.

This is not just luck – the restoration of native bush and the control of pests around Tawa gives improved habitats and food supplies for these birds, and for the multitude of smaller creatures that have their homes in the native bush.

The Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves (FOTBR) has been working to regenerate this bush, as well as building a network of tracks to improve access for residents and visitors. And on Sunday 18 August, Wellington Mayor Celia Wade-Brown will lend a helping hand, planting a tree in Woodburn Reserve with the Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves.

"The Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves are doing great work in the Tawa Community and deserve recognition for their efforts," said Mayor Wade-Brown.

"Wellington's urban/nature connections are part of the Capital's identity. Through the Our Living City programme, Wellington will plant two million trees by 2020 – and the Tawa community is making a great start on our goal."

Richard Herbert, FOTBR's President, says the event continues the work that FOTBR has been carrying out. "We are delighted that Mayor Wade-Brown will plant a tree in Woodburn Reserve. Wellington City Council have been very supportive of the work of Friends of Tawa Bush Reserves over the past ten years, and it is great to celebrate this by planting a tree."

"While this tree makes a difference, we invite those that may wish also to plant trees, maintain tracks and carry out weeding to join us on our monthly working bees. We think that Tawa will be a better place as a result." www.tawabush.wellington.net.nz provides details of dates and locations.

The planting will be carried out on the afternoon of Sunday 18 August. People attending will congregate at the accessway adjacent to 76 Bing Lucas Drive, Tawa, at 1pm, and make their way to the planting site, a short walk over the hill to the Woodburn Reserve planting site. If it is a rainy day, an alternative date may be arranged. All are welcome to attend.

After the planting, people are invited to take a short walk further into Woodburn Reserve, to see the tracks and some of the native bush.
